FORTHCOMING TRIPS

Sunday 5th October: Frampton in Autumn Leader: Nick Goatman

Meet in the small car park, Watery Lane GL2 7DZ at 8:30 am. The walk should last for approximately 3 hours. Nick visits the site almost daily and will usually be able to any spot new arrivals. We should see the remnants of our summer visitors, passage migrants and the arrival of over wintering birds.

Frampton is a flat area with a mixture of good paths and grassy fields making for easy walking.

Sunday 26th October: Autumn visit to Slimbridge Leader: Dot Jones

Dot will meet everyone in the main WWT car park at 9:30. The organised walk will last approximately 3-4 hours, but of course you might like to stay longer. Migration should be well under way, so birds such as Golden Plover and White-fronted Geese might start to come in as well as wintering ducks such as Pintail and Wigeon, and there's always the possibility of spotting a rare vagrant or two.

TRIP REPORTS

Chipping Sodbury Common

Seventeen (yes, seventeen! I had to do a couple of recounts...!) DBWPS members arrived on Chipping Sodbury Common at 0830 for a morning-only mooch in search of migrants. Although we stayed dry throughout, the wind was pretty much continuous, and it made the birding quite

challenging. Unsurprisingly, Sparrowhawk was the only raptor seen.

One of our 'target' species was Redstart, so it was pleasing when we picked up one calling repeatedly and all members subsequently had good views of two birds. We also did wonderfully well with warblers, as both Whitethroat and Lesser Whitethroat were seen clearly and Willow Warbler, Blackcap and Chiffchaff also located.

A small number of hirundines were seen overhead and the odd gull flapped casually by, along

with a collection of corvids and numerous Woodpigeon. A Green Woodpecker was heard 'yaffling' in the trees a couple of times. As we turned square to head along the hedgerow back towards the road, we were pleased to eventually spot two Whinchats with one particularly well-marked bird perching obligingly on the edge of a low bush for us, giving excellent views. This was very atypical of small passerines on the day...!

A couple of Meadow Pipits took off from the grass as we made our way back to our cars and two Ravens were tumbling above the trees in the distance. Unfortunately, no flycatchers or Yellow Wagtail were seen, the cattle

remaining amongst the long grass throughout not helping with the latter.

Thanks to Mike for leading, and for timing the trip so perfectly that it concluded about 5 minutes before the rain arrived...!



On Monday 22nd September our first meeting of this season was well attended with a total of 21 members and visitors together. We were delighted to find some improvements at the hall made a simple job of plugging in the computer and our speaker Conor, was able to use the new large screen and speaker system for his talk.

Conor gave us a lively and interesting talk on his research leading to his book on the almost forgotten conservationist, naturalist and author William Hudson.



W. H. Hudson was born on August 4th 1841 near Buenos Aires, Argentina. His parents, originally from New England, set up as sheep farmers on the Argentinean Pampas and the young William led an idyllic childhood. This was recalled later in his book "Far away and Long ago" published in 1918. In his youth he learnt to ride bareback on his horse, observing plant and bird life along the way and living very much a Gaucho life style. Having never attending a school he became more studious after a life affecting illness at age 15. He was very much influenced by Charles Darwin, "Origin of species" and the writings of Gilbert White. He became a prolific writer, a trait that followed him throughout the rest of his life. In 1874 he left Buenos Aires and a month later arrived in Southampton, he then travelled by train to London where he met Philip Slater of the Zoological Society.

Hudson became very involved in conservation issues, managing to secure a ban on the plumage trade, a move that helped save Egrets and other species. Other achievements

include saving Kew Gardens from development and a pamphlet on Barn Owls to help ban the use of pole traps. He also campaigned to stop the sale of stuffed birds and eggs robbed from nests.

Times were hard and for a while he slept rough in Hyde Park. He eventually met and married a woman older than himself in 1876 and they made a living from two boarding houses. She then inherited a house in Bayswater where they lived for the rest of their lives. He wrote several romance novels all based in South America and had a sense of nature's power.

He became friends with Eliza Phillips of the "Bird Society" and also Catherine Hall and Emily Wilson who created the "Society for the Protection of Birds" later to become the RSPB.

Several books all with an England flavour were published, "Birds in a Cookham Garden", "Lost British Birds". Yorkshire and the Farne Islands" and "Nature in Downland" based in Sussex".

During his later life he managed to dodge the Spanish Flu epidemic and he achieved hero status when he saved three girls from being swept out to sea. All in all a full life well lived.
